

Summer Reading Ideas

Research has shown that the simple greatest factor in predicting reading success is whether a child is read to when young. Here are some titles to get you started. Please note that the reading level of the books suggested varies. If your child is already reading, have him or her read a page of the book aloud to you to see if it is a good fit. If they struggle with more than a few words on the page, it is probably too difficult, but the book would still be a great book to read aloud to your child.

Developmental Skills

Every child is special and unique and develops at their own pace. However, there are certain skills and knowledge sets that we feel are essential for social and academic growth, development and achievement in school. The following is a checklist of essential developmental skills children need to meet before they enter kindergarten at Arlington Classics Academy.

- Be able to state their first and last name when asked.
- Sit still for a story.
- Have a positive attitude.
- Work well with others.
- Use good table manners and clean up their own area.
- Child should be broken of habits such as sucking thumbs or picking nose due to germ issues.
- Use restroom independently and knows how to wash hands.
- Knows how to snap, zip or button pants.
- Can tie shoes. If student cannot tie shoes, Velcro shoes or lace-less shoes are encouraged.
- Listen to adults and peers and show respect.
- Follow rules.
- Take off and put on outer clothing such as a jacket.
